The humble petition of the Reverend Horace
Ayton Hill Rector of the Rectory and Parish
Churches of East and West Worlington in the County
of Devon and your Lordships Diocese.

Sheweth

That there is belonging to the House of Residence
of your Petitioner's benefice of East Worlington an old Shed
thatched with reed and entirely open in front and recently used
as a Coach house and which is coloured blue on the plan
hereto annexed

That your petitioner has recently built a new
Coach house in the position ^{shown} on the said plan and coloured
red the walls thereof being of stone and the roof covered
with corrugated iron with a properly paved floor and
contains ample room for two conveyances and as the old
shed is in a very dilapidated condition and is not now
required for the purposes of the said benefice your petitioner
proposes to remove it leaving the North wall standing in
proper repair to complete the fence around the Courtyard
and to apply the proceeds of such removal in defraying the
cost thereof.

That the Patron of the said Benefice is consenting
to the prayer of this Petition as appears by his consent
heron endorsed.

Wherefore your Petitioner humbly prays your Lordships
that you will be pleased (under the provisions of the
Ecclesiastical Dilapidations Act 1871) to grant your
license for the removal of the said old Shed and the
proposed application of the proceeds.

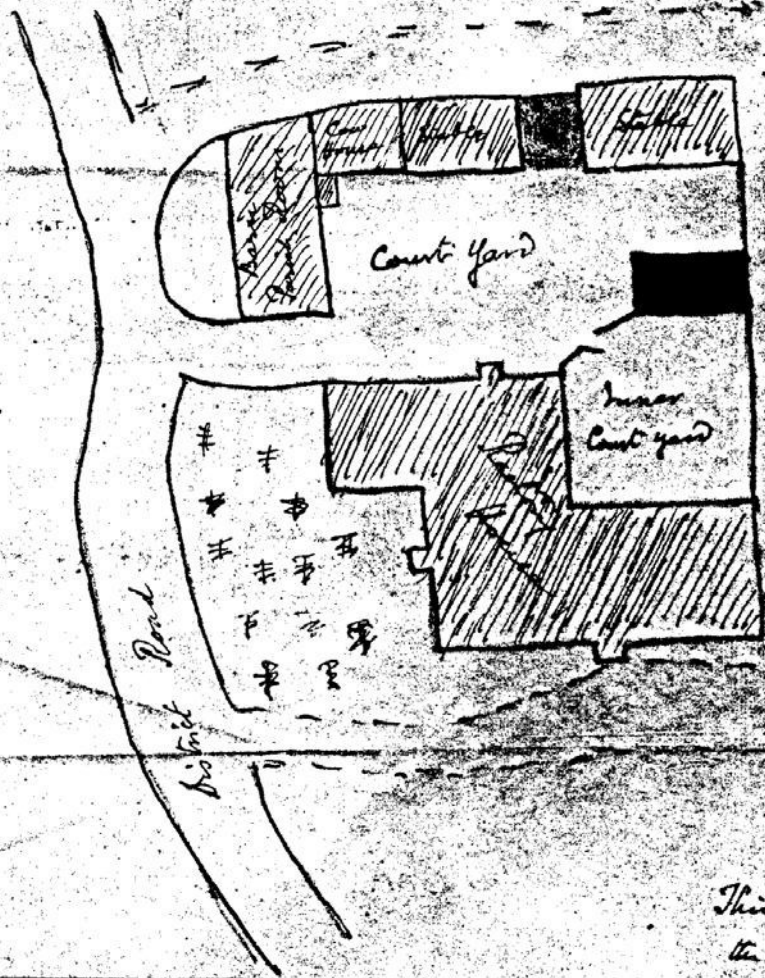
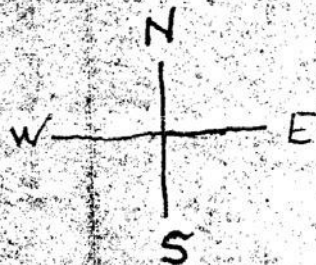

Dear Sir,

I have recently built a new coach-house at East Woolington Rectory. The walls are of stone, the roof of corrugated iron and there is a properly paved floor: three coats of paint were laid on all iron and wood-work. There is ample accommodation for the keeping of two coach-

beverages. Previous to this there
was only an ancient shed
thatched with reed and entirely
open in front and an uneven
floor of earth and this had
to serve as the only place
for the keeping of beverages.

I shall be glad to know
whether this old shed may
be pulled down now that
a better provision is made
for a carriage house; or,
if it is allowed to remain,
I may be declared exempt
from the duty of repairing it.

in order to secure effect to
this application?
